Item

1. Welcome and apologies

In attendance were: AS, BR, DJ, FB, JA, JP, MW, MY, MG, SD, SF, SL, SP, MP, VB, DF, CP and ZY.

Apologies were received from BW.

SP welcomed CP and ZY (guest actuaries) to the GIPC meeting.

SP reminded GIPC to be cognisant of competition law requirements in discussions and in its work.

SP asked if anyone has a conflict of interest in relation to an agenda item to declare this. None were raised.

2. Minutes of previous meeting

The minutes of the previous meeting held on 14 March 2024 were approved.

3. Actions from last meeting

An update on outstanding actions was given, as set out in the table at the end of these minutes.

4. Agenda discussion

- (a) Data science CP (chair of DSWG) provided reflections on the use of AI in general insurance, followed by Q&A and an open discussion with GIPC across several themes:
 - Adoption of AI looking across actuarial practice areas, GI is a leader on adopting AI, with it in active use in pricing, although it is also emerging in reserving. Generative AI is also reaching a broader populace
 - Transformation general insurers have broad transformation agendas that are likely to see the
 expansion of (and investment going into) Al into reserving, operations and claims management.
 With such opportunities, how can actuaries get involved instead of being overlooked?

- Ethical use both government and companies have been / are building principles around fairness, bias, etc.. Should actuaries be developing skills and be moving into this space?
- Education a high proportion of fellowship students are taking the data applications course and therefore receiving this education. However for members who qualified earlier or otherwise haven't taken this route, how do we provide this education?
- Institute activities YDAWG has been active in collating resources (e.g. cookbook, explainer articles). Institute is starting a project about AI and what it means for the profession (e.g. what worked well / poorly, lessons learned). IFOA has published a thematic review on actuaries using AI. IAA has also set up an AI taskforce with 5 workstreams covering professionalism and ethics, education, the changing role of actuaries, governance and innovation
- What support do practitioners need practitioners work in a range of areas, with those working in advanced data science teams likely to be well supported with training, etc. but actuaries working in other areas are less likely to have this. Training is not just about technical training (e.g. ability to code) but understanding its use and limitations (e.g. risk of hallucinations) and ethics are also important. Raise awareness, provide tools and case studies to equip people in an accessible manner (i.e. don't need people to undertake a degree in data science)
- (b) Guest actuary ZY introduced himself and shared some reflections as an actuary from the Australian Institute working in China:
 - Institute has been active in building connections into China, as evidenced by Naomi Edward's
 recent visit. There is further opportunity to invite Australian members to present in local events
 - Actuaries in China typically work in either AA / reserving or data analytics / pricing areas
 - There is only a small community of Institute members in China. Actuaries in the Chinese market are typically with CAS. The Institute is working towards being reinstated in the list of accredited actuarial professional bodies for AA roles in China
- (c) GIPC updates SP provided several updates on people movements and GIPC activities:
 - Standard covers in insurance Institute submitted a response to this consultation, with thanks to SP, BR and others for their support
 - Budget night Institute is looking for a GI volunteer for budget night (14 May)
 - NSW ESL consultation Institute is looking for volunteers for this submission (due 20 May)
 - Secretarial role SF will be taking on co-secretary role with MP
 - Professional standards role SL will be stepping down from GIPC at the end of 2024 and we will be looking for a new GIPC member to take on her role as professional standards lead
 - Updated membership statistics and GIPC strategy page SP shared latest statistics and updates to GIPC's strategy page
- (d) APRA DJ provided an update on APRA's activities in the last month:
 - APRA's release of rules and guidance on FAR and a cross industry information package on FAR
 - APRA Executive Director speech to Future of Insurance 2024 industry is strong but is evolving.

Insurers are making progress on stability and resilience. Long term sustainability also means meeting customer needs, including developing a range of solutions, ensuring customers understand their risks, products and options. Affordability is a challenge. Transparency is critical to improve customer outcomes and how insurers use information. APRA encourages insurers to take ownership of these challenges

- John Lonsdale's speech to AFR Banking Summit APRA is launching its first financial system stress test in 2025 and will release an accompanying PPG to CPS230
- (e) Risk register MY led a review discussion on the human capital risk on actuarial education in the risk register (risk relating to actuaries failing to keep pace with emerging skills demand):
 - Al is a risk, with potential gaps being younger actuaries who have technical but lack domain knowledge and GI practitioners who don't use it day to day but have the opportunities to use it (or the need to use it). LMS development will help to bridge some of this gap
 - Shortening qualification times are translating to fellows qualifying earlier and therefore with less experience on average than before
